Chapter 1

System Overview

The American Megatrends Super Voyager PCI (Peripheral Component Interconnect) ISA motherboard includes an 80486 CPU and supports the EPA Green PC Specifications. This motherboard has two PCI Local Bus expansion slots and five ISA expansion slots.

Features

The American Megatrends Series 76 Super Voyager PCI motherboard has the following features:

- supports 256 KB of direct-mapped write-back secondary cache memory,
- supports from 2 to 128 MB of interleaved system memory via two to four x 36 single-sided or double-sided SIMMs on the motherboard,
- includes American Megatrends PRIDE™ high-speed IDE support on the PCI bus,
- includes an SMC FDC37C661 or FDC37C665 100-pin PQFP Universal Peripheral Controller that supports two NS16C550 serial ports, a parallel port, an IDE controller, and a floppy controller,
- includes a 128 KB flash EPROM for the system BIOS,
- has a battery-backed Real Time Clock with 128 bytes of CMOS RAM to store system configuration data, and
- has four ISA, two PCI expansion slots, and a future expansion slot. ISA adapter cards can be used in the future expansion slot (which looks like an EISA expansion slot but does not accept EISA adapter cards).

Green PC Features

The American Megatrends Super Voyager PCI motherboard has been designed with the EPA Green PC specifications in mind. The Green PC features include:

- a low power chipset,
- Sleep Mode, which allows the system to go to a low power consumption mode of operation when the PC is idle,
- the American Megatrends MEGAKEY keyboard controller BIOS places the computer in Sleep Mode if no keyboard, mouse, COM1, or COM2 activity occurs for an end user-specified time period,
- a clock generator IC is used that allows the main clock frequency to be set to 8 MHz during Sleep Mode. The frequency switching is within the specifications of the normal Intel® 486 family. This feature allows the clock frequency to be reduced without using a special static core microprocessor,. Thus a substantial power savings is realized without adding to the system cost,
- a special two-pin header issues a TTL level signal used to turn off the auxiliary AC power receptacle on Green PC power supplies while in Sleep Mode,
- a special 10-pin header can be connected to the feature connector of a standard VGA Controller card. A signal from this header drives HSYNC, VSYNC, and Enable Video Low during Sleep Mode. If a Green PC monitor is used, the monitor switches to its own low power mode during Sleep Mode.

Compliance with EPA Green PC Specifications

To meet the Green PC specifications, a computer system must be able to enter an idle state (Sleep Mode) that reduces the total system power use to 30 watts or less. The monitor and printer must also use no more than 30 watts.

Responsibility for Meeting Green PC Requirements

The system integrator is ultimately responsible for meeting all Green PC specifications and performing the tests necessary to obtain Energy Star approval, because the motherboard is only one component in the system. Other components have a major impact on system power use.

Green PC Test

The American Megatrends Super Voyager PCI motherboard has been tested and found to comply with the EPA Green PC specifications with the following system configuration. There was a margin of 3 watts, which should allow for some variation in the configuration.

- 8 MB of DRAM,
- an Intel 80486DX2-66 CPU,
- a Boca PN4430 VGA controller,
- a Western Digital Caviar IDE drive model number WDAC2200-32F,
- a Toshiba 1.2 MB floppy drive, model number ND-0801GR, and
- an Antec 220W Green PC Power Supply, model number PP-200U/220U.

Green PC Hot Keys

A keyboard hot key is any multiple keystroke operation that causes the keyboard controller to execute a complex system function transparent to the system operating system. The AMIBIOS system BIOS and the American Megatrends MEGAKEY keyboard controller used in the Super Voyager PCI motherboard provide several hot key features.

Because of the highly programmable nature of the MEGAKEY and the AMIBIOS, configuring the functionality and keystroke assignments can be done by the OEM. After system BIOS POST (Power On Self Test) completes, AMIBIOS initializes the MEGAKEY keyboard controller using values preset by the OEM via AMIBCP (American Megatrends BIOS Configuration Program). The MEGAKEY supports hot key control of: system security locking and system power down mode.

System Security Locking Hot Key

The default hot key option for this feature is <Ctrl> <Alt> <Backspace>, which can be changed by the OEM through AMIBCP. When the System Password feature is enabled in AMIBIOS Setup, the end user can enable the AutoKeyLock feature at any time by pressing <Ctrl> <Alt> <Backspace>. AutoKeyLock is used when the end user must leave the computer unattended and does not want anybody else to use it. Once AutoKeyLock is enabled, the MEGAKEY keyboard controller accepts no keyboard or mouse input until the correct password is entered. The Num Lock, Caps Lock, and Scroll Lock LEDs (and the Password LED if present) blink when the system is password locked.

Green PC Hot Keys, Continued

System Power Down Mode Hot Key

Three hot key sequences are provided for Green PC system power down mode. The hot keys are active if the Green PC system power saving mode is enabled in AMIBIOS Setup.

<Ctrl> <Alt> <[> puts the system into immediate power down mode. All timers in the MEGAKEY are overridden and the MEGAKEY I/O pins that were defined for power management control are switched to low state. The key sequence can be changed by the OEM through AMIBCP. This feature allows the end user to place the system in power down mode immediately.

<Ctrl> <Alt> <[> disables the Green PC power savings mode temporarily. All timers in the MEGAKEY are disabled. The key sequence can be changed by the OEM through AMIBCP. This feature allows the end user to disable the Green PC power down mode temporarily for CPU-intensive operations that may take a long time to execute with no activity on the keyboard, mouse, or device activity-sensing hardware.

<Ctrl> <Alt> <]> enables the Green PC power down mode. All timers in the MEGAKEY are reactivated. The key sequence can be changed by the OEM through AMIBCP.

System State Indication in Various Modes

The system state can be indicated in various modes through the keyboard Num Lock, Caps Lock, Scroll Lock, Turbo LED, and Password LED (also possibly the Power LED) on the computer front panel.

Using the Turbo LED

The Turbo LED indicates if the system is using low or high operating frequency. The Turbo LED should be controlled by the same MEGAKEY I/O pin that controls the CPU clock switching. If the Turbo LED is on, the system is operating at high operating frequency. If the Turbo LED is off, the system is at low operating frequency.

Green PC Hot Keys, Continued

Indicating AutoKeyLock Status via LEDs

AutoKeyLock is indicated by the keyboard Num Lock, Caps Lock and Scroll Lock LEDs and also through a Password LED, if present. Blinking Num Lock, Caps Lock, and Scroll Lock LEDs indicate that the system is password locked. The Password LED also blinks if present. When the correct password is entered, the lock is deactivated.

Hot Key Sequence Summary

The following table lists the AMIBIOS and MEGAKEY Green PC hot key sequences and the state of Password LED in various modes:

System Condition	Password LED State	Other information
The password feature is enabled through AMIBIOS Setup and <Ctrl> <Alt> <Backspace> is pressed.	The LED blinks until the correct password is entered via the keyboard.	The Keyboard Num Lock, Caps Lock, and Scroll Lock LEDs also blink until the correct password is entered via the keyboard.

Green PC Jumpers and Bergs

J7 Password LED Select

J7 is a three-pin berg that selects the Password LED.

If a Password LED is not mounted on the computer case, another LED, such as the Power LED, can be made to flash if Pins 1-2 of J7 are shorted.

J7 Pin Settings	LED selected
Short Pins 1-2	Front panel power LED is Password LED.
Short Pins 2-3	Separate Password LED using P19 (<i>Factory setting</i>).

P19 Password LED

P19 is a two-pin berg that can be attached via a cable to an LED that flashes when the system has been inactive for a specified length of time and Pins 2-3 of J7 are shorted.

The end user must enter the correct system password if the Password LED is blinking. The system has experienced no system activity during the length of time specified in the AutoKeyLock option in AMIBIOS Setup ADVANCED CMOS SETUP. As a result of the AMIBIOS AutoKeyLock feature being enabled, AMIBIOS does not permit the system to be used until the correct password is entered.

The AMIBIOS system password feature and AMIBIOS Green PC AutoKeyLock feature must be enabled before the Password LED will blink when the correct system password must be entered by the end user.

P35 Sleep Switch

P35 is a two-pin berg that attaches to an externally-mounted switch via a two-wire cable. The computer enters Sleep Mode immediately when the end user presses this switch.

Green PC Implementation Disclaimers

Green PC Responsibility belongs to System Integrator

The system integrator must be responsible for Green PC compliance. American Megatrends has simply supplied the means to meet the Green PC requirements and cannot be held responsible for final system assembly.

When to Disable Sleep Mode

If a computer will be running an application that requires long durations of microprocessor activity with no input from the keyboard, mouse, COM1, or COM2, Sleep Mode should be disabled in AMIBIOS Setup.

If Sleep Mode is not disabled, the system will switch to sleep mode and the system performance will be greatly decreased. Some examples of such applications are: file servers, CAD systems, software compilers, screen savers, and many more.

No Need for Screen Savers

<p><i>Important</i></p> <p><i>Screen saver software should not be used with Sleep Mode enabled.</i></p>
--

Sleep Mode serves the same purpose as a screen saver and obviates the need for a screen saver.

Buses are Slowed during Sleep Mode

The PCI and ISA bus run at a slow speed during Sleep Mode, which may cause compatibility problems if certain adapter cards are accessed during Sleep Mode.

PCI

PCI is an Intel specification for a CPU Local Bus standard. The PCI specification also provides the electrical specifications for peripheral chip makers and the logic requirements for a PCI Controller. While PCI defines a local bus standard, it also defines a standard component-level interface. PCI is a common I/O component interface.

When thought of only as a local bus, PCI is a multiplexed extension of the CPU bus. In PCI, the CPU bus control mechanisms have been extended to optimize I/O support.

The primary purpose of PCI is to establish a local bus standard in which a large variety of I/O components can be directly connected without using any glue logic.

Unlike other local bus specifications that can cause bottlenecks and actual interference with the CPU signals, the PCI specification provides for a standalone PCI Controller to manage the data transfer between PCI peripherals and the memory/CPU.

The PCI architecture is essentially a CPU-to-local bus bridge with FIFO buffers.

What PCI Accomplishes

PCI is a way to physically interconnect highly integrated peripheral components and processor/memory systems.

PCI Features

Up to ten PCI loads can be used in the same system on the PCI bus, including the PCI Controller and an expansion bus controller for EISA, ISA, or MCA. PCI decouples the CPU from the expansion bus and works at 33 MHz but can use either a 32-bit or 64-bit data connection path to the CPU.

PCI, Continued

PCI Features

PCI:

- is processor-independent,
- has a multiplexed burst mode operation,
- runs synchronous with the CPU at speeds up to 33 MHz,
- has a maximum data transfer rate of 120 MBs (with a peak rate of 132 MBs on a 32-bit data path),
- has a maximum data transfer rate of 240 MBs (with a peak rate of 264 MBs on a 64-bit data path),
- has an optional 64-bit data path that is transparently interoperable with the 32-bit data path,
- has low latency random accesses (about 60 ns write access latency) to slave registers from a PCI bus master on the PCI bus,
- is capable of full concurrency with the processor and PCI bus masters,
- has full multimaster capability, allowing any PCI Master peer-to-peer access to any PCI slave,
- has hidden and overlapped central arbitration,
- has a low pin count (master - 47; slave - 45),
- has address and data parity, and
- uses three physical address spaces: 32-bit memory, 32-bit I/O, and a 256 byte-per-agent configuration space.

PCI, Continued

PCI Diagram

The following is a typical PCI system block diagram.

Queued Reads and Writes

The PCI Controller queues reads and writes between the memory/CPU and PCI peripheral devices.

PCI, Continued

Concurrent Operation

The CPU in a PCI system runs concurrently with PCI bus mastering peripherals. Although bus mastering peripheral devices are arbitrated, significant data transfer rate improvements can be achieved without splitting resource utilization between the CPU and a bus mastering device. Peripheral devices can operate at up to 33 MHz in a PCI environment.

Bus Mastering

Bus mastering devices can operate simultaneously on the PCI bus. PCI devices can be bus masters, slaves, or a combination of bus master and slave.

Burst Mode

The PCI specification also provides for burst mode of any length for both reads and writes. However, the 486 CPU only permits burst mode on reads.

Multiplexing

PCI is a multiplexed bus. Multiplexing allows more than one signal to be sent on the same electrical path. The control mechanisms have been modified and extended to optimize I/O support.

Using PCI Adapter Cards

The American Megatrends Series 76 Super Voyager PCI motherboard has two PCI expansion slots. The PCI expansion slots can accept any adapter card that complies with the PCI Revision 2.0 specification.

PCI, Continued

The Super Voyager PCI Motherboard conforms to the Intel PCI specifications. PCI standardizes the hardware interface of peripherals connected to a microprocessor-level local bus. The PCI Local Bus Specification is a standard set of interface, architecture, timings, electrical, and physical specifications that permits all PCI Local Bus products to be totally interchangeable.

PCI Component Classes

PCI components must be one of three classes:

- bus master,
- slave, or
- master/slave combination.

Super Voyager PCI Dimensions

The Super Voyager PCI motherboard is approximately 8.5 inches wide by 13 inches long (the standard Baby AT® size with similar mounting hole locations). The following graphic shows the dimensions and height restrictions.

Specifications

The American Megatrends Series 76 Super Voyager PCI motherboard is a six-layer board in a Baby AT footprint.

The Super Voyager PCI motherboard has onboard PRIDE (Performance Rich Integrated Drive Electronics) on the PCI bus. The motherboard has a Universal I/O Controller that provide support for floppy drives, serial ports, and a parallel port. The American Megatrends proprietary PRIDE interface consistently outperforms ISA IDE drives and provides for IDE Mode 0, Mode 1, or Mode 2 transfer rates.

Motherboard Frequency

The Super Voyager PCI motherboard operates at either High or Low speed. High speed is the same as the speed of the CPU mounted on the motherboard. Low speed is approximately the same speed as that of an 8 MHz IBM® AT. Low speed is achieved by emulation.

Socketed CPUs

The following 25 or 33 MHz Intel CPUs are supported on the Super Voyager PCI motherboard:

Specifications, Continued

Cache Memory

The Super Voyager PCI motherboard has 256 KB of factory-installed L2 secondary cache memory. The cache memory architecture is direct-mapped write-back.

The Intel Pentium Overdrive CPU is supported in write-through mode only. The external cache memory will be in write-back mode.

Up to 128 MB of system memory DRAM can be read from or written to the 80486 internal cache memory.

Up to 64 MB of DRAM system memory can be read from or written to the L2 secondary (external) cache memory.

Onboard System Memory

The Series 76 Super Voyager PCI motherboard supports from 2 to 128 MB of system memory.

The Series 76 Super Voyager PCI motherboard can have two or four x 36 SIMMs in four SIMM sockets. The Super Voyager PCI motherboard supports 256 KB x 36, 1 MB x 36, and 4 MB x 36 single sided SIMMs and 512 KB x 36, 2 MB x 36, or 8 MB x 36 double-sided SIMMs.

70 ns fast page mode DRAMs are required. Memory is always interleaved. The memory architecture is paged. Parity is checked on all system memory reads to ensure data integrity.

Specifications, Continued

CMOS RAM

The Super Voyager PCI motherboard has 128 bytes of CMOS RAM on the Real Time Clock.

CMOS RAM is configured by AMIBIOS Setup, resident with the system BIOS on the Flash EPROM.

Write Buffers

The write buffers used in the Super Voyager PCI motherboard are:

- a four doubleword-deep write buffer on the CPU to memory port.
- a two doubleword-deep write buffer on the PCI bus to memory port.
- a four doubleword-deep write buffer on the CPU to PCI bus port.

Chipset

The Super Voyager PCI motherboard chipset consists of: a Cache and DRAM Controller, a Data Path Unit, and a System I/O Controller.

System BIOS

The system BIOS resides on a 128 KB boot block flash EPROM and supports shadowing between C0000h and EFFFFh in 16 KB granularity and between F0000h and FFFFFh in 64 KB granularity. Memory between C0000h and FFFFFh can also be read from or written to secondary cache memory and write-protected via AMIBIOS Setup options. The system BIOS can be updated through the AMIFlash software utility.

Specifications, Continued

Adaptor ROM BIOS

The Adaptor ROM BIOS can be shadowed, made cacheable, and can be write-protected with 16 KB granularity.

PCI Expansion Slots

The Super Voyager PCI motherboard has two bus mastering PCI slots operating at 25 or 33 MHz synchronous with the CPU clock.

ISA Expansion Slots and Bus Speed

The Super Voyager PCI motherboard has five ISA expansion slots — four standalone ISA expansion slots and a special ISA expansion slot (which looks like an EISA expansion slot but is not) that is reserved for future expansion or an ISA adapter card. This special ISA expansion slot shares a mounting bracket on the chassis with the adjacent PCI expansion slot. Either the PCI or ISA adapter card (not both) can be mounted on these two slots.

The ISA bus operates at 8.33 or 8.25 MHz.

Mouse

The Super Voyager PCI motherboard supports a PS/2- compatible mouse interface through a 10-pin dual-inline berg.

Keyboard

The standard Super Voyager PCI motherboard has a five-pin DIN keyboard connector.

Green PC Monitor Connector

The FDC37C665 Universal Peripheral Controller supports two floppy drives (which can be 360 KB, 1.2 MB, 720 KB, 1.44 MB, or 2.88 MB), an IDE controller, two serial ports (National Semiconductor 16C550s), and one parallel port compatible with the Extended Capabilities Port (ECP).

PRIDE Interface

The Series 76 Super Voyager PCI motherboard implements a fast IDE on the PCI bus. This interface is the American Megatrends Performance Rich Integrated Drive Electronics interface. PRIDE performs faster than standard IDE controllers.

Unpacking the Motherboard

Step	Action
1	Inspect the cardboard carton for obvious damage. If damaged, call Technical Support at 404-246-8600. Leave the motherboard in its original packing.
2	Perform all unpacking and installation procedures on a ground-connected anti-static mat. Wear an anti-static wristband, grounded at the same point as the anti-static mat or use a sheet of conductive aluminum foil grounded through a 1 megohm resistor instead of the anti-static mat. Similarly, a strip of conductive aluminum foil wrapped around the wrist and grounded through a 1 megohm resistor serves the same purpose as the wristband.
3	Inside the carton, the motherboard is packed in an anti-static bag and sandwiched between sheets of sponge. Remove the sponge and the anti-static bag. Place the motherboard on a grounded anti-static surface component side up. Save the original packing material in case of reshipment.
4	Inspect the motherboard for damage. Press down on all ICs mounted in sockets to verify proper seating. Do not apply power to the motherboard if it has been damaged.
5	If the motherboard is undamaged, it is ready to be installed.

Installing SIMMs

Four SIMM sockets are located at the expansion slot end of the motherboard. These sockets can be filled with either 256 KB x 36, 512 KB x 36, 1 MB x 36, 2 MB x 36, 4 MB x 36, or 8 MB x 36 SIMMs. Place the motherboard on an anti-static mat. With the component side of the SIMM facing you, firmly push the SIMM into the socket at a 45 degree angle, then push it up to a vertical position. When properly inserted, the SIMM clicks into place as the latching pins engage. See the following figure.

Normally, the x 36 SIMMs look like this:

Reporting Memory

The system memory configuration is reported by AMIBIOS as it boots and again when the AMIBIOS System Configuration Screen is displayed just before the operating system is booted. The memory reported by AMIBIOS is 384 KB less than the total amount of memory installed in the system because the memory between 640K and 1024K can be used to shadow the video, system, and other adapter BIOS.

Step 3 Install Upgrade Processor

In most cases, the CPU is already installed in the American Megatrends Super Voyager PCI motherboard. The only reason to remove the CPU is:

- CPU failure or
- to install an upgrade processor.

CPU failure is highly unlikely. If the CPU must be replaced, follow the procedures described in this step.

Warning

Improper CPU or Upgrade Processor installation can damage the CPU and/or the motherboard. You must follow the procedures in this section exactly as documented.

Processor Type and Speed

The empty ZIF (zero insertion force) CPU socket is a 237-pin socket near one edge of the motherboard. The following CPUs can be inserted in this socket. The CPU pin count is given because several of these CPUs do not use all 237 pins and must be carefully mounted in the center of the socket.

Installing an Upgrade Processor

The following discussion applies only to 169-pin processors, such as the 80486DX, 80486DX2, 80486SX, 80487SX, P23T, or P24 CPU.

If the motherboard already has a surface-mounted 486SX PQFP CPU, you must disable the onboard CPU by setting SW2 Switch 4 ON before you install the upgrade CPU.

CPU installation is easy because the Super Voyager PCI motherboard has a ZIF (zero insertion force) socket. The Super Voyager PCI motherboard does not have a separate socket for a coprocessor or upgrade CPU. Instead, upgrade processors are installed directly in the CPU socket.

Step	Action
1	Remove the CPU by lifting the lever on the ZIF socket and then extracting the CPU. The empty CPU socket looks like this.
2	Pin 1 of the socket has a white diagonal line across one corner on the motherboard, which corresponds to pin 1 of the CPU. Check for bent pins on the CPU chip. Gently straighten any bent pins with pliers. Place the CPU squarely in the middle of the socket, <i>making sure that one row of socket pins shows on all four sides</i> . Make sure that pin 1 of the CPU is aligned with pin 1 of the socket.
3	The CPU socket is a 240-pin socket. But (as shown in the above table) 80486DX, 80486DX2, 80486SX, 80487SX, P24, and P23T CPUs come in 169-pin packages. <i>When these processors are installed, an extra row of socket pins should show on all four sides of the socket</i> , as shown in the following illustration.

Installing a Pentium Overdrive CPU

The Pentium Overdrive CPU is a 240-pin package that uses all socket pins. Use the same procedure describe above to install the Pentium Overdrive. However, when a Pentium Overdrive CPU is properly installed, it uses all 240 pins, so no extra socket pins can be seen.

Step 4 Install the Motherboard

The mounting hole pattern on the Super Voyager PCI motherboard is approximately the same as the mounting hole pattern on any Baby AT motherboard. Standoffs and mounting screws are not supplied with the motherboard.

Step	Action
1	Wear an anti-static wristband when performing this procedure.
2	Place the chassis on an anti-static mat. Connect the chassis to ground to avoid static damage during installation. Connect an alligator clip with a wire lead to any unpainted part of the chassis. Ground the other end of the lead at the same point as the mat and the wristband that you are wearing.
3	Rotate the chassis so that the front is to the right, and the rear is to the left. The side facing you is where the motherboard is mounted. The power supply is mounted at the far end of the chassis.
4	Push four nylon standoffs from the solder side of the motherboard into the holes provided for them. The standoffs lock in place. Find the slots provided for the standoffs on the chassis. Hold the motherboard, component-side up, with the edge with the standoffs toward you and the edge with the power supply connector away from you. The edge connectors for the adapter cards should be to the left.
5	Carefully slide the motherboard into the chassis. Make certain that the standoffs fit the slots provided for them. The motherboard should not slide if the standoffs are properly locked. The motherboard should also rest level with the chassis. The far edge should fit the slots in the plastic clips.
6	Place the two mounting screws in the proper holes and tighten. If necessary, shift the motherboard slightly to align the mounting holes on the motherboard with the holes on the chassis. Refer to the graphic on page .

The computer case manufacturer may supply installation instructions. If so, follow the computer case manufacturer installation procedures as well as the above procedures.

Step 5 Connect the Power Supply

The power supply should match the physical configuration of the chassis. Make sure that the power switch is Off before assembly.

Before attaching all components, make sure that the proper voltage has been selected. Power supplies often can run on a wide range of voltages and must be set (usually via a switch) to the proper range. Use at least a 230 watt power supply that has built-in filters to suppress EMI radiated emissions.

Connect to P8 and P9

Attach the power supply cables to P8 and P9 on the motherboard. AT-compatible power supplies have two 6-pin connectors. The 6-pin connector with 3 red wires and 2 black wires is connected to P9 and the remaining 6-pin connector is connected to P8, as shown below. P11 is an auxiliary power supply connector.

Caution

P11 is not a 5V power connector.

Step 5 Connect the Power Supply, Continued

When attaching chassis connectors to the motherboard, make sure you connect the correct connector end. Most connector wires are color-coded. Match the color of the wires leaving the switch or LED to the same pin on the connector end. There may be more than one connector with the same color-coded wires. If so, follow the wire to the switch or LED. Pin 1 of all connectors can be determined easily. Each jumper is surrounded by a white line etched on the motherboard. One end of the white line always ends in a arrow. Pin 1 is always at the pointed end of the white line. Pin 1 is designated by a square pad on the motherboard graphic. The Super Voyager PCI motherboard provides full compatibility with all IBM XT and AT-compatible adapter cards via five ISA (AT-compatible) expansion slots. The Super Voyager PCI motherboard also has two PCI Local Bus expansion slots. A summary of the slots follows.

Step 13 Test and Configure

Review the following points before powering up:

- ✓ make sure that all adapter cards are seated properly,
- ✓ make sure all connectors are properly installed,
- ✓ if the upgrade processor is used, make sure it is seated properly,
- ✓ make sure there are no screws or other foreign material on the motherboard,
- ✓ plug the system into a surge-protected power strip, and
- ✓ make sure blank back panels are installed on the back of the chassis to minimize RF emissions.

Start the Test

Plug everything in and turn on the switch. If there are any signs of a problem, turn off the unit immediately. Reinstall the connectors. Call American Megatrends Technical Support at 404-246-8600 if there are problems.

AMIBIOS Errors

If the system operates normally, a display should appear on the monitor. AMIBIOS Power On Self Test (POST) should execute. If POST does not run successfully, it will beep or display error messages.

Beeps indicate a serious problem with the system configuration or hardware. The Beep Code (see page) indicates the problem. Make sure the affected part is properly seated and connected.

An error message is displayed if the error is less serious. Recheck the system configuration or the connections.

Step 13 Test and Configure, Continued

Configure the System

Run AMIBIOS Setup. You must enter the requested information and save the configuration data in CMOS RAM. The system will then reset, run POST, and boot the operating system. See page for information on configuring the system via STANDARD CMOS SETUP.

Chapter 3

AMIBIOS Power-On Self Test

AMIBIOS provides all IBM-standard POST routines as well as enhanced AMIBIOS POST routines and CPU internal diagnostics. AMIBIOS POST codes can be accessed via the Manufacturing Test Port (I/O Port 80h). AMIBIOS POST checkpoint codes are described in the *ISA and EISA Hi-Flex AMIBIOS Technical Reference*.

POST Phases

When the system is powered on, the AMIBIOS executes POST, which has two phases:

- *System Test and Initialization* (test and initialize motherboards for normal operations), and
- *System Configuration Verification* (compare defined configuration with there hardware actually installed).

AMIBIOS Error Reporting

The AMIBIOS performs diagnostic when the system is powered up. Error s are reported in one of two ways:

If..	Then..
the error occurs before the display device is initialized,	a series of beeps sound. Beep codes indicate that a fatal error has occurred. The AMIBIOS Beep Codes are described on the next page.
the error occurs after the display device is initialized,	the error message is displayed. Displayed error messages are explained below. A prompt to press <F1> can also appear.

Beep Codes

Errors may occur during AMIBIOS POST (Power On Self Test). Fatal errors are communicated through a series of audible beeps. All errors except Beep Code 8 are fatal.

Beeps	Error message	Description
1	Refresh Failure	The memory refresh circuitry on the motherboard is faulty.
2	Parity Error	Parity error in the first 64 KB of memory.
3	Base 64 KB Memory Failure	Memory failure in first 64 KB.
4	Timer Not Operational	Memory failure in the first 64 KB or Timer 1 on the motherboard is not functioning.
5	Processor error	The CPU (Central Processing Unit) on the motherboard has generated an error.
6	8042 - Gate A20 Failure	AMIBIOS cannot switch to protected mode.
7	Processor Exception Interrupt Error	The CPU on the motherboard generated an exception interrupt.
8	Display Memory Read/Write Error	The system video adapter is either missing or its memory is faulty.
9	ROM Checksum Error	The ROM checksum value does not match the value encoded in AMIBIOS.
10	CMOS Shutdown Register Read/Write Error	The shutdown register for CMOS RAM failed.

What to Do If the Computer Beeps

If the system beeps...	then...
1, 2, or 3 times...	reseat the memory SIMMs or DIPs. If the system still beeps, replace the memory.
6 times...	reseat the keyboard controller chip. If it still beeps, replace the keyboard controller. If it still beeps, try a different keyboard, or replace the keyboard fuse, if the keyboard has one.

8 times...	memory error on the video adapter. Replace the video adapter, or the RAM on the video adapter.
9 times...	the BIOS ROM chip is bad. The system probably needs a new BIOS ROM chip.
11 times...	reseat the cache memory on the motherboard. If it still beeps, replace the cache memory.
4, 5, 7, or 10 times...	the motherboard must be replaced.

AMIBIOS Displayed Error Messages

If POST initializes the system video monitor, errors can be displayed on the screen. These errors usually allow the system to continue. They are listed on Page . Error message are displayed as follows:

CMOS System Options Not Set	The values stored in CMOS RAM are either corrupt or nonexistent. Run AMIBIOS Setup.
CMOS Display Type Mismatch	The video type in CMOS RAM does not match the type detected by AMIBIOS. Run AMIBIOS Setup.
CMOS Memory Size Mismatch	The amount of memory on the motherboard is different than the amount in CMOS RAM. Run AMIBIOS Setup.
CMOS Time & Date Not Set	Run the STANDARD CMOS SETUP to set the date and time in CMOS RAM.

D: Drive Error	No response from drive D:. Run the Hard Disk Utility. Check the D: hard disk type in STANDARD CMOS SETUP.
D: drive failure	No response from drive D:. It may be necessary to replace the hard disk.
Diskette Boot Failure	The boot diskette in floppy drive A: cannot be used to boot the system. Use another boot diskette and follow the screen instructions.
Display Switch Not Proper	Some systems require video switch on the motherboard be set to either color or monochrome. Turn the system off, set the switch properly, then power on.
DMA Error	Error in the DMA controller on the motherboard.
DMA #1 Error	Error in the first DMA channel on the motherboard.
DMA #2 Error	Error in the second DMA channel on the motherboard.
FDD Controller Failure	AMIBIOS cannot communicate with the floppy disk drive controller. Check all appropriate connections after the system is powered down.

INTR #1 Error	Interrupt channel #1 has failed POST.

You can increase processor speeds at any time by pressing <Ctrl><Alt><+>. Processor speed can be decreased by pressing <Ctrl><Alt><->. Of course, the OEM can modify these keystroke combinations via AMIBCP. The above values are merely the default settings.

Enable Cache Memory

External cache memory can be enabled by pressing <Ctrl><Alt><Shift><+> or disabled by pressing <Ctrl><Alt><Shift><->. The OEM can modify these keystroke combinations via AMIBCP. The above values are merely the default settings.

AMIBIOS Setup Parts

AMIBIOS Setup has five parts:

- STANDARD CMOS SETUP,
- ADVANCED CMOS SETUP,
- ADVANCED CHIPSET SETUP,
- POWER MANAGEMENT SETUP, and

AMIBIOS Identification

The AMIBIOS for the Super Voyager PCI motherboard has the following identification parameters.

Section 1

Running AMIBIOS Setup

The system parameters (such as amount of memory, disk drives, video displays, and numeric coprocessors) is stored in CMOS RAM. When the computer is turned off, a back-up battery provides power to CMOS RAM, which retains the system parameters. Every time the system is powered-on, it is configured with these values, unless CMOS RAM has been corrupted.

The system configuration parameters are set via AMIBIOS Setup. AMIBIOS Setup resides in the ROM BIOS (Read Only Memory Basic Input/Output System) and is available each time the computer is turned on.

Default System Parameters

If CMOS RAM is bad, the system is configured with the default values stored in ROM. There are two sets of BIOS values stored in the ROM file: the BIOS Setup default values and the Power-On default values.

Starting AMIBIOS Setup

As POST executes, the following appears:

BIOS Default Values

AMIBIOS has default settings for all options. In STANDARD CMOS SETUP, default values are only loaded if CMOS RAM is corrupt. All STANDARD CMOS SETUP default settings are disabled (floppy, hard disk, monitor, keyboard). In all other type of Setup, both BIOS and Power-On defaults are provided for most options.

Loading the BIOS Setup Defaults

You can load the BIOS Setup defaults for the AMIBIOS Setup screen currently being displayed by pressing <F6>. The BIOS Setup default value are best-case values that should optimize system performance. If CMOS RAM is corrupted, the BIOS defaults are loaded automatically.

Loading the Power-On Defaults

You can load the Power-On defaults for the AMIBIOS Setup screen currently being displayed by pressing <F7>. Power-On default values are worst-case values for system performance, but are the most stable values. Use this option as a diagnostic aid if the system is behaving erratically.

Auto Configuration With BIOS Defaults

Auto Configuration With BIOS Defaults uses the default system settings for all AMIBIOS Setup options. The BIOS defaults are best-case settings that optimize system performance. If CMOS RAM is corrupted, the BIOS default settings are automatically loaded. Highlight this option, type Y, and press <Enter> to use BIOS defaults. The following appears:

`Default values loaded. Press any key to continue.`

Auto Configuration With Power-On Defaults

This option configures the Power-On default settings for all AMIBIOS Setup options. These are not optimal for system performance, but are the most stable settings. Use this option as a diagnostic aid if the system is erratic. Highlight this option, type *Y*, and press <Enter>. The following appears:

`Default values loaded. Press any key to continue.`

AUTO DETECT HARD DISK

When enabled, this option displays the parameters for IDE hard disk drives as shown below. You can accept or reject the parameters.

If an IDE drive is found, AMIBIOS places the hard disk drive parameters that it finds in the Hard Drive C: or Hard Drive D: field in STANDARD CMOS SETUP and sets Type 47. All you have to do is accept these values.

Write to CMOS and Exit

The specified configurations settings are stored in CMOS RAM when this option is selected. A CMOS RAM checksum is calculated and written to CMOS RAM and control is passed to the system BIOS.

`Write to CMOS and Exit (Y/N) ? N`

appears. Press *N* and <Enter> to return to the Main Menu. Press *Y* to save the system parameters and continue the boot process. AMIBIOS either reboots the system (if any new settings change the memory map) or continues to boot.

Do Not Write to CMOS RAM and Exit

This option passes control to the BIOS without writing any changes to CMOS RAM. Press *N* and <Enter> to return to the Main Menu. Press *Y* and <Enter> to continue the boot process without saving any system parameters.

Section 2

STANDARD CMOS SETUP

STANDARD CMOS SETUP is the first option on the Main Menu. Press <Enter> at the highlighted selection to display this option. The following screen appears.

STANDARD CMOS SETUP Options

Date And Day Configuration

Ranges for each value are shown in the lower left corner of the STANDARD CMOS SETUP Screen. Move the cursor to the Date field with ↑ and ↓ and set the Date and Day by pressing <PgUp> and <PgDn> to change the values.

STANDARD CMOS SETUP Options, Continued

Time Configuration

This option uses a 24 hour clock. For PM numbers, add 12 to the hour. Enter 4:30 P.M. as 16:30:00. Move the cursor to the Time field via ↑ and ↓ and set the time by pressing <PgUp> and <PgDn>.

Hard Disk Drive Type C:

Hard Disk Drive Type D:

Move the cursor to these fields via ↑ and ↓ and select the hard disk drive type by pressing <PgUp> and <PgDn>. *Not Installed* is used for diskless workstations and SCSI hard disks. Match the drive parameters for the drive in your computer with the parameters in the hard drive type table on page . If none of the drive types match, use type 47.

Type 47 is used for IDE drives and can be used for both hard disks C: and D:. If you select Type 47, you must enter the hard disk drive parameters.

Parameter	Description
Type	The number for a drive with certain identification parameters.
Cylinders	The number of cylinders in the disk drive.
Heads	The number of heads.
Write Precompensation	The size of a sector gets progressively smaller as the track diameter diminishes. Yet each sector must still hold 512 bytes. Write precompensation circuitry on the hard disk compensates for the physical difference in sector size by boosting the write current for sectors on inner tracks. This parameter is the track number where write precompensation begins.
Landing Zone	This number is the cylinder location where the heads will normally park when the system is shut down.
Sectors	The number of sectors per track. MFM drives have 17 sectors per track. RLL drives have 26 sectors per track. ESDI drives have 34 sectors per track. SCSI and IDE drive may have even more sectors per track.
Capacity	The formatted capacity of the drive is (Number of heads) x (Number of cylinders) x (Number of sectors per track) x (512 bytes per sector)

Using Auto Detect Hard Disk

If you select the Auto Detect Hard Disk option from the AMIBIOS Main Menu screen, the AMIBIOS automatically finds all IDE hard disk drive parameters. AMIBIOS places the hard disk drive parameters that it finds in the Hard Drive C: or Hard Drive D: field in STANDARD CMOS SETUP and sets Type 47. All you have to do is accept these values.

Floppy Drive A:

Floppy Drive B:

Move the cursor to these fields via ↑ and ↓ and select the floppy type via <PgUp> and <PgDn>. The settings are *360 KB 5¼ inch*, *1.2 MB 5¼ inch*, *720 KB 3½ inch*, *1.44 MB 3½ inch*, *2.88 MB 3½ inch*, or *Not Installed*. *Not Installed* is used for diskless workstations.

Monitor

Move the cursor to this field via ↑ and ↓ and select the monitor type via <PgUp> and <PgDn>. The settings are *Monochrome*, *Color 40x25*, *Color 80x25*, *VGA/PGA/EGA*, or *Not Installed*. *Not Installed* is used for network file servers.

Keyboard

Move the cursor to this field via ↑ and ↓ and make a selection via <PgUp> and <PgDn>. The settings are *Installed* or *Not Installed* (used for network file servers).

ADVANCED CMOS SETUP Options

Typematic Rate Programming

Typematic Rate Delay

Typematic Rate

Typematic Rate Programming enables or disables the following two options. Typematic Rate Delay (*250, 500, 750, or 1,000 milliseconds*) and Typematic Rate (*6, 8, 10, 12, 14, 15, 20, 24, or 30 characters per second*) control the speed at which a keystroke is repeated. When a key is pressed and held down, the associated character is displayed. After a delay specified by the Typematic Rate Delay, the character repeats at the Typematic Rate. The defaults are:

Mouse Support Option

When this option is enabled, AMIBIOS supports a PS/2-type mouse. The settings are *Enabled* or *Disabled*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On default is *Disabled*.

Above 1 MB Memory Test

When this option is enabled, the BIOS memory test is performed on all system memory. When this option is disabled, the memory test is only performed on the first 1 MB of system memory. The settings are *Enabled* or *Disabled*. The BIOS Setup default is *Enabled*. The Power-On default is *Disabled*.

Memory Test Tick Sound

This option enables (turns on) or disables (turns off) the ticking sound during the memory test. The BIOS Setup and Power-On default is *Enabled*.

ADVANCED CMOS SETUP Options, Continued

Memory Parity Error Checking

This option enables or disables parity error checking for system RAM. The settings are *Enabled* (all system RAM parity is checked) or *Disabled* (parity is checked only on the first 1 MB of system RAM). The BIOS Setup default is *Enabled*. The Power-On default is *Disabled*.

Hit Message Display

Disabling this option prevents

```
Hit <DEL> if you want to run Setup
```

from appearing when the system boots. The settings are *Enabled* or *Disabled*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On default is *Enabled*.

Wait for <F1> If Any Error

AMIBIOS POST runs system diagnostic tests that can generate a message followed by:

```
Press <F1> to continue
```

If this option is enabled, AMIBIOS waits for the end user to press <F1> before continuing. If this option is disabled, AMIBIOS continues the boot process without waiting for <F1> to be pressed. The settings are *Enabled* or *Disabled*. The BIOS Setup default is *Enabled*. The Power-On default is *Disabled*.

System Boot Up Num Lock

When *On*, this option turns off *Num Lock* when the system is powered on so the end user can use the arrow keys on both the numeric keypad and the keyboard. The settings are *On* or *Off*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On default is *On*.

ADVANCED CMOS SETUP Options, Continued

Floppy Drive Seek At Boot

When this option is enabled, AMIBIOS performs a Seek command on floppy drive A: before booting the system. The settings are *Enabled* or *Disabled*. The BIOS Setup default is *Disabled*. The Power-On default is *Enabled*.

System Boot Up Sequence

This option sets the sequence of boot drives (either floppy drive A: or hard disk drive C:) that the AMIBIOS attempts to boot from after AMIBIOS POST completes. The settings are *C:,A:* or *A:,C:*. The BIOS Setup default is *C:,A:*. The Power-On default is *A:,C:*.

System Boot Up CPU Speed

This option sets the speed of the CPU at system boot time. The settings are *High* or *Low*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On default is *High*.

Cache Memory

This option enables cache memory. If *Both* is selected, internal cache and external cache memory is enabled. If *Internal* is chosen, only the internal cache memory in the 486 CPU is enabled. If *Disabled* is chosen, all cache memory is disabled. The settings are *Internal*, *Disabled*, or *Both*. The BIOS Setup default is *Both*. The Power-On default is *Disabled*.

External Cache Mode

This option selects the type of caching algorithm used by AMIBIOS and the computer for L2 (external) secondary cache memory. The settings are *Wr-Thru* or *Wr-Back*. The BIOS Setup default is *Wr-Back*. The Power-On default is *Wr-Thru*.

ADVANCED CMOS SETUP Options, Continued

Password Checking Option

This option enables the password check option every time the system boots or the end user runs Setup. If *Always* is chosen, a user password prompt appears every time the computer is turned on. If *Setup* is chosen, the password prompt appears if AMIBIOS Setup is executed. See page for instructions on changing a password. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Setup*.

ISA Video ROM at C000,32K

ISA Adaptor ROM at C800,16K

ISA Adaptor ROM at CC00,16K

ISA Adaptor ROM at D000,16K

ISA Adaptor ROM at D400,16K

ISA Adaptor ROM at D800,16K

ISA Adaptor ROM at DC00,16K

These options enable shadowing of the contents of the ROM area named in the option title. For example, If the **ISA Adaptor ROM at CC00,16K** option is set to *Shadow*, the contents of the RAM area from CC000h - CFFFFh can be shadowed from ROM to RAM.

The settings are *Absent*, *NoShadow*, or *Shadow*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults for all of the above options is *Absent*.

The ROM area that is not used by ISA adapter cards will be allocated to PCI adapter cards.

ADVANCED CMOS SETUP Options, Continued

Boot Sector Virus Protection

When this option is enabled, AMIBIOS issues a warning when any program (or virus) issues a Disk Format command or attempts to write to the boot sector of the hard disk drive. The settings are *Enabled* or *Disabled*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On default is *Disabled*. If enabled, the following appears when a write is attempted to the boot sector. You may have to type *N* several times to prevent the boot sector write.

Performance Rich IDE

When this option is enabled, the American Megatrends PRIDE (Performance Rich IDE) circuitry is enabled. PRIDE improves IDE hard disk drive throughput. The settings are *Enabled* or *Disabled*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Disabled*.

ADVANCED CMOS SETUP Options, Continued

Perf.Rich IDE Transfer Mode

This option sets the data transfer mode for the Performance Rich IDE circuitry. The settings are *Auto*, *Mode 0*, *Mode 1*, or *Mode 2*. If *Auto* is selected, AMIBIOS automatically determines the optimal mode. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Auto*. The AMIBIOS Setup Auto Detect Hard Disk feature can detect and report all IDE drive parameters. Select **Auto Detect Hard Drive** from the AMIBIOS Setup main menu to determine which IDE Transfer Mode is supported by the IDE drive in your computer. See page for additional information about the AMIBIOS Setup Auto Detect hard drive feature.

IDE Block Mode Transfer

This option enables multiple sector reads and writes for IDE drives. The settings are *Enabled* or *Disabled*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Disabled*.

ADVANCED CHIPSET SETUP Options

Base Memory Size

This option sets the size of the base system memory. The settings are *512 KB* or *640 KB*. The BIOS Setup default is *640 KB*. The Power-On default is *512 KB*.

DRAM Performance Mode

This option sets the DRAM system memory performance mode. The settings are *Standard* or *Enhanced*. The BIOS Setup default is *Enhanced*. The Power-On default is *Standard*.

ADVANCED CHIPSET SETUP Options, Continued

ISA VGA Frame Buffer Size

This option must be set to *Enabled* if the VGA card installed in the system requires a frame buffer. This option sets the size of the VGA frame buffer. The settings are *Disabled* or *Enabled*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Disabled*.

ISA VGA Frame Buf. Base Addr

This option sets the base address (or starting point) of the VGA frame buffer. This option must be set to *Enabled* if the VGA card installed in the system requires a frame buffer. The settings are not established at this time. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *(N/A)*.

ISA IRQ 9

At least one IRQ must be free for each PCI Card in the system. If the PCI Card includes a multifunction device, at least two or more IRQs must be free. This option specifies if IRQ 9 is used. The settings are *Free* or *Used*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Free*.

ISA IRQ 10

At least one IRQ must be free for each PCI Card in the system. If the PCI Card includes a multifunction device, at least two or more IRQs must be free. This option specifies if IRQ 10 is used in ISA. The settings are *Free* or *Used*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Free*.

ISA IRQ 11

This option must be set to *Enabled* if any ISA adapter card installed in the system requires VGA palette snooping. The settings are *Enabled* or *Disabled*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On Defaults are *Disabled*.

Power Management Setup Options

Green PC Support

This option enables Green PC support features in AMIBIOS. The settings are *Disabled*, or the length of time of no mouse, keyboard, COM1, or COM2 activity after which the system will go to low power mode. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Disabled*.

Auto Key-Lock Timeout

This option sets the timeout value for the AMIBIOS Green PC AutoKeyLock feature. If Password support is enabled, AutoKeyLock automatically locks the keyboard and mouse if there has been no system activity for the length of time specified in this option. The settings are *Disabled, 1 Min., 2 Min., 3 Min., 4 Min., 5 Min., 6 Min., 7 Min., 8 Min., 9 Min., 10 Min., 11 Min., 12 Min., 13 Min., 14 Min., or 15 Min.* The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Disabled*.

Peripheral Management Setup Options

Programming Option

The settings are *Auto* or *Manual*. When set to *Auto*, the BIOS automatically detects all adapter cards installed in the system and configures the onboard I/O (serial ports, parallel ports, floppy controllers, and IDE controller) automatically. All other Peripheral Setup option settings are ignored. Any serial port, parallel port, floppy controller, or IDE (Integrated Drive Electronics) controller on an adapter card in an expansion slot is configured before onboard I/O. If *Auto* is selected, the BIOS also attempts to avoid IRQ conflicts.

If the offboard serial ports are configured to specific starting I/O ports via jumper settings, the BIOS will configure the onboard serial ports to avoid conflicts. For example, if the default serial port starting I/O ports (serial port1 - 3F8h, serial port2 - 2F8h, serial port3 - 3E8h, serial port4 - 2E8h) are used, the following serial port configurations are possible:

If *Manual* is selected, the settings chosen by the end user in Peripheral Setup apply.

AMIBIOS reports any I/O conflicts after displaying the BIOS Configuration Summary Screen, but only if *Manual* is chosen. The BIOS Setup and Power-On default is *Auto*.

Peripheral Management Setup Options, Continued

On-Board Floppy Drive

This option enables the use of the floppy drive controller on the motherboard (if installed). The settings are *Enabled* or *Disabled*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Disabled*.

On-Board IDE Drive

This option enables the use of the IDE controller on the motherboard (if installed). The settings are *Enabled* or *Disabled*. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Disabled*.

First Serial Port Address

IRQ4 is used for the first serial port (COM1). This option enables serial port 1 on the motherboard (if installed). The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Disabled*. The settings are *Disabled* or any valid I/O port address consisting of three hex digits.

Second Serial Port Address

IRQ3 is used for the second serial port (COM2). This option enables serial port 2 on the motherboard, if installed. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Disabled*. The settings are *Disabled* or any valid I/O port address consisting of three hex digits.

Parallel Port Address

IRQ7 is used for the parallel port (LPT1). The IRQ can be changed to IRQ5 via J3. This option enables the parallel port on the motherboard, if installed. The settings are *Disabled* or any valid I/O port address consisting of three hex digits. The BIOS Setup and Power-On defaults are *Disabled*.

Section 7

AMIBIOS Password Support

AMIBIOS Setup has an optional password feature. The system can be configured so that all users must enter a password every time the system boots or when Setup is executed.

Setting a Password

The password check option is enabled in ADVANCED CMOS SETUP (see page) by choosing either *Always* (the password prompt appears every time the system is powered on) or *Setup* (the password prompt appears only when AMIBIOS Setup is run). The password is stored in CMOS RAM.

The system asks for a password.

Enter a 1 – 6 character password. The password does not appear on the screen when typed. Make sure you write it down. If you forget it, you must drain CMOS RAM and reconfigure the system.

If You Do Not Want to Use a Password

Just press <Enter> when the password prompt appears.

Changing a Password

Select the *Change Password* option from the Setup Main Menu. Enter the password and press <Enter>. The screen does not display the characters entered. After the new password is entered, retype the new password as prompted and press <Enter>.

If the password confirmation is incorrect, an error message appears. If the new password is entered without error, press <Esc> to return to the AMIBIOS Setup Main Menu. The password is stored in CMOS RAM after AMIBIOS Setup completes. The next time the system boots, you are prompted for the password if the password function is present and is enabled.

Remember the Password

Keep a record of the new password when the password is changed. If you forget the password, remove the computer cover, set switch 1-2 (the DIAG switch) to ON, power on the computer. AMIBIOS will erase the password.

When Hard Disk Diagnostics is selected, the following screen appears.

Select an option and press <Enter>.

Hard Disk Format Utility

Warning

The Hard Disk Format utility destroys all hard disk data. Back up the data on the hard disk before running this utility.

This routine does not work on IDE or SCSI drives. Use Hard Disk Format to integrate a new hard disk to the system, or to reformat a used hard disk which has bad tracks as a result of aging or poor handling. Select Media Analysis to find bad tracks. The following screen appears when Hard Disk Format is selected.

Hard Disk Format Utility, Continued

Answer the questions on the screen. The first two questions are already completed if only one hard disk drive was selected in STANDARD CMOS SETUP and the cursor is on *Interleave*. The Disk Drive Type is read from CMOS RAM. The interleave factor can be selected manually or determined by the Auto Interleave routine.

The hard disk drive manufacturer usually provides a list of bad tracks. Enter these tracks. They are then labeled as bad to prevent data from being stored on them. The following screen is displayed after entering *Y* in Mark Bad Tracks, pressing <Enter>, and selecting add, delete, revise, or clear from the Bad Track Edit Menu.

Type *Y* and press <Enter>. A warning screen appears. Press any key to continue.

Warning

Data on the hard disk drive will be irrevocably lost.

Auto Interleave Utility

Warning

The Auto Interleave utility destroys hard disk data. Back up the data on the hard disk before running this utility.

The Auto Interleave utility calculates the optimum interleave factor through trial and error by measuring the transfer rate for four different interleave values. To determine the best interleave factor, the system formats a portion of the hard disk for each transfer rate calculated. The cylinders, heads and sectors formatted for each value is displayed in the activity box. It does not work on IDE or SCSI drives.

Select Auto Interleave on the main Hard Disk Utility Screen and press <Enter>. The following appears.

The cursor is on *Mark Bad Tracks*. The default is *N*. To mark additional bad tracks, type *Y* and press <Enter>. After selecting options from the Bad Tracks Edit Menu, press <Esc>. Type *Y* and press <Enter> to proceed with the Auto Interleave process. A warning screen appears. Press <Enter> to return to the main Hard Disk Utility screen. To proceed, type *Y* and press <Enter>.

Media Analysis Utility

The Media Analysis utility performs a series of tests to locate bad or damaged tracks on the hard disk as a result of aging or poor handling. This utility locates all bad tracks and lists them in the Bad Track List Box. Since this test writes to all cylinders and heads on the hard disk to verify any bad tracks, the test requires several minutes to complete. For best results, run this test in its entirety. Media Analysis does not work on IDE or SCSI drives.

Select *Media Analysis* from the main Hard Disk Utility Menu and press <Enter>. The following screen appears.

The cursor is on *Proceed*. The warning screen appears. Press <Enter> to stop. The main Hard Disk Utility screen appears. Type *Y* and press <Enter> to perform the hard disk drive analysis.

Initialization Errors

Message	Explanation
No Hard Disk Installed	There is no hard disk drive in the system but Hard Disk Utility was selected.
FATAL ERROR Bad Hard Disk	No response from the hard disk, or the hard disk is not repairable. Check all cable and power connections to the hard disk.
Hard Disk Controller Failure	Error response from the reset command sent to the hard disk controller. The controller may not be seated properly.
C: (D:) Hard Disk Failure	The hard disk drive (C: or D:) is not responding to commands. Check power and cable connections to the hard disk.

Operation Errors

Message	Explanation
Address Mark Not Found	The address mark (initial address) on the hard disk could not be found.
Attachment Failed to Respond	No response from the hard disk drive.
Bad ECC on Disk Read	When the hard disk drive utility writes to the disk, it also calculates an ECC (Error Correction Code) value for the data being written. This ECC value is written to the drive and then read back. The value read back is different from the one calculated.
Bad Sector Flag Detected	An operation was performed on a sector flagged as bad.
Controller Has Failed	A diagnostic command issued to the controller failed.
Drive Not Ready	An operation on the hard disk drive timed out. The hard disk drive utility waited beyond a preset specified time limit.
Drive Parameter Activity Failed	A reset command was sent to the controller followed by drive parameters. Using these parameters, the controller did not get a response from the hard disk. Make sure the drive type is correct.
ECC Corrected Data Error	The ECC value read from the disk is not the same value which was written to the disk. The data is not correct. An attempt was made to correct the data, but the ECC value is not corrected.
Requested Sector Not Found	The requested sector could not be found.
Reset Failed	The reset command did not properly reset the hard disk.
Seek Operation Failed	A seek command failed. A seek operation is the act of finding a particular sector on the hard disk.
Undefined Error - Command Aborted	An unidentifiable error condition occurred.
Write Fault on Selected Drive	A write fault occurred during the write operation on the hard disk drive.

Appendix A

Flash EPROM Programming

The American Megatrends Super Voyager PCI motherboard uses Flash EPROM to store the system BIOS. The advantage of using a Flash EPROM is that the EPROM chip does not have to be replaced to update the BIOS. The end user can actually reprogram the BIOS, using a ROM file supplied by American Megatrends.

There are three methods for programming the Flash EPROM:

- program from system boot,
- set SW2 switch 6 ON, or
- run the AMIFlash utility.

Programming Flash from System Boot

Using the floppy disk with the new BIOS file, press and hold down <Ctrl> <Home> to reprogram the Super Voyager PCI motherboard Flash EPROM-based AMIBIOS before DOS boots.

Using AMIFlash

AMIFlash is a DOS utility that is executed from the DOS command line. You can reprogram the Super Voyager PCI motherboard Flash EPROM-based AMIBIOS from the DOS command prompt using AMIFlash.

Set SW2 Switch 6

Insert the floppy disk with the new BIOS in floppy drive A:. Set SW2 switch 6 ON to program the Flash EPROM.

Reprogramming from System Boot

When you reprogram from system boot, the American Megatrends Flash utility:

1. reads S76P.ROM from the root directory of the floppy disk in drive A:;
2. erases the Flash EPROM,
3. programs the Flash EPROM with the data read from the floppy disk in drive A:, and
4. generates a CPU reset, rebooting the system.

The AMIFlash portion of Flash EPROM is not programmed.

S76P.ROM

S76P.ROM resides on a floppy disk and contains the updated main BIOS code. American Megatrends will provide this file when the AMIBIOS for the Series 76 Super Voyager PCI motherboard must be updated.

S76P.ROM must be present in the root directory of the floppy disk before the onboard Flash EPROM can be reprogrammed. The file that has the main BIOS code must be named S76P.ROM.

Programming the Flash EPROM

Step	Action
1	Turn system power off.
2	Place the floppy disk that has the latest S76P.ROM BIOS file in floppy drive A:.
3	Make sure that the system has a speaker that is connected.
4	Turn system power on while pressing and holding down the <Ctrl> and <Home> keys.

Reprogramming from System Boot, Continued

Sequence of Operation

The following table lists the sequence of operation and the expected behavior of the AMIFlash Code.

Step	Expected behavior
1 Look for floppy disk.	The system beeps one time before the BIOS attempts to read from floppy drive A:.
2 Look for S76P.ROM on the floppy disk.	S76P.ROM must be in the root directory of the floppy disk in drive A:. There is no beep if successful.
3 Read the floppy disk.	The floppy disk is read. There is no beep if this step is successful.
4 Check for BIOS file size.	The BIOS file size is checked. There is no beep if this step is successful.
5 Check for Flash EPROM.	The BIOS looks for an Intel i28F001BX-T Flash EPROM. It does not beep if this step is successful.
6 Erase the Flash EPROM.	Two beeps sound when the BIOS begins erasing the Flash EPROM.
7 Program the Flash EPROM.	Three beeps sound when the AMIFlash Code begins reprogramming the Flash EPROM.
8 Continue programming the Flash EPROM.	Four beeps sound when reprogramming has been successfully completed.
9 AMIFlash does a reset.	A CPU reset is generated (the system reboots).
10 Reboot	Reboot the system.

Reprogramming from System Boot, Continued

Beep Codes

During normal operation, the Flash utility produces a series of beeps to:

- signify completion of a step (as shown on the previous page), or to
- signal an error.

Error beeps are arranged in a coded sequence and have different meanings depending on when they occur. The following list describes the error beep codes and when they can occur.

1	Continuous Single Beep	There is no floppy disk in Drive A:.
2	Five Beeps	S76P.ROM is not present in the root directory of the floppy disk in the A: drive.

Type

```

and press <Enter> at the DOS prompt. AMIFlash will prompt for the filename. Type

and press <Enter>. Pressing <Esc> exits AMIFlash any time before Flash EPROM reprogramming begins.

General Operation

If Flash EPROM is present, AMIFlash asks if you want to save the existing BIOS file. If you choose to save the BIOS, enter the filename where the existing BIOS will be saved.

AMIFlash, Continued

Enter the filename with which Flash EPROM will be reprogrammed (S76P.ROM). AMIFlash reads the file and displays a startup message. A Press any key to continue. After Flash programming starts, programming activity is indicated by a rotating / character. AMIFlash informs you when Flash programming is successful (as shown below). Press any key to reboot the system.

Errors During Flash Programming

If an error occurs during programming, an error messages is displayed and the system halts. Turn power off and replace the Flash EPROM with a new programmed Flash EPROM to make the system usable.
